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The Aesthetic Imperative - Peter Sloterdijk 2018-03-15

In this wide-ranging book, renowned philosopher and cultural theorist Peter Sloterdijk examines art in all its rich and varied forms: from music to architecture, light to movement, and design to typography. Moving between the visible and the invisible, the audible and the inaudible, his analyses span the centuries, from ancient civilizations to contemporary Hollywood. With great verve and insight he considers the key issues that have faced thinkers from Aristotle to Adorno, looking at art in its relation to ethics, metaphysics, society, politics, anthropology and the subject. Sloterdijk explores a variety of topics, from the Greco-Roman invention of postcards to the rise of the capitalist art market, from the black boxes and white cubes of modernism to the growth of museums and memorial culture. In doing so, he extends his characteristic method of defamiliarization to transform the way we look at works of art and artistic movements. His bold and original approach leads us away from the well-trodden paths of conventional art history to develop a theory of aesthetics which rejects strict categorization, emphasizing instead the crucial importance of individual subjectivity as a counter to the latent

dangers of collective culture. This sustained reflection, at once playful, serious and provocative, goes to the very heart of Sloterdijk's enduring philosophical preoccupation with the aesthetic. It will be essential reading for students and scholars of philosophy and aesthetics and will appeal to anyone interested in culture and the arts more generally.

Husserl and Intentionality - D.W Smith 2012-12-06

This book has roots in our respective doctoral dissertations, both completed in 1970 at Stanford under the tutelage of Professors Dagfnm Føllesdal, John D. Goheen, and Jaakko Hintikka. In the fall of 1970 we wrote a joint article that proved to be a prolegomenon to the present work, our 'Intentionality via Intensions', *The Journal of Philosophy* 68 (1971). Professor Hintikka then suggested we write a joint book, and in the spring of 1971 we began writing the present work. The project was to last ten years as our conception of the project continued to grow at each stage. Our intellectual debts follow the history of our project. During our dissertation days at Stanford, we joined with fellow doctoral candidates John Lad and Michael Sukale and Professors Føllesdal, Goheen, and Hintikka in an informal seminar on phenomenology that met weekly from June of 1969 through March of 1970. During the summers of

1973 and 1974 we regrouped in another informal seminar on phenomenology, meeting weekly at Stanford and sometimes Berkeley, the regular participants being ourselves, Hubert Dreyfus, Dagfnm Føllesdal, Jane Lipsky McIntyre, Izchak Miller, and, in 1974, John Haugeland.

This book is a collection of essays on Husserl's Crisis of European

Sciences by leading philosophers of science and scholars of Husserl. Published and ignored under the Nazi dictatorship, Husserl's last work has never received the attention its author's prominence demands. In the Crisis, Husserl considers the gap that has grown between the "life-world" of everyday human experience and the world of mathematical science. He argues that the two have become disconnected because we misunderstand our own scientific past—we confuse mathematical idealities with concrete reality and thereby undermine the validity of our immediate experience. The philosopher's foundational work in the theory of intentionality is relevant to contemporary discussions of qualia, naive science, and the fact-value distinction. The scholars included in this volume consider Husserl's diagnosis of this "crisis" and his proposed solution. Topics addressed include Husserl's late philosophy, the relation between scientific and everyday objects and "worlds," the history of Greek and Galilean science, the philosophy of history, and Husserl's influence on Foucault.

E in effetti sembrano spiegare perché in *Giornalismo culturale* la critica letteraria sia in netta minoranza. Dal 2013 al 2020, periodo nel quale sono stati scritti gli articoli qui raccolti, l'oggetto privilegiato non è la letteratura, ma la cultura nel suo insieme: le idee correnti o dominanti, le élite intellettuali, i linguaggi, le istituzioni, le mode culturali, i luoghi comuni del discorso politico e gli effetti della rete sulla vita di tutti. Eppure quello di Berardinelli è un giornalismo culturale anomalo e singolarmente enciclopedico. È soprattutto analisi del conformismo sociale, delle sue

ragioni e delle forme in cui si manifesta. Ed è contraddistinto da una grande mobilità critica a partire dalla grande varietà di occasioni, spunti e casi offerti dall'attualità e dalla cronaca - cui fa da corrispettivo una grande varietà di stili, che spaziano dalla dialettica argomentativa all'ironia distanziante alla vera e propria satira culturale. Una satira tanto più necessaria da quando arti, scienze, filosofia e letteratura sono viste come valori in sé, attività autogarantite e indiscutibili per principio, al punto da far sembrare scorretta o inconcepibile qualunque valutazione selettiva e qualitativa che orienti in una cultura di massa in continua espansione e da cui gli stessi intellettuali sono stati conquistati, ipnotizzati e disarmati. Although this book is a translation from Dutch, the chief obstacle to be overcome was Husserl's (German) technical terminology. As I sought English equivalents for German phenomenological terms, I made thankful use of Dorion Cairns' Guide for Translating Husserl as well as existing translations of Husserl's works, especially J. N. Findlay's rendering of *Logische Untersuchungen*. Since the technical terminology in the various translations and English studies of Husserl is far from uniform, I had to devise my own system of equivalents for key Husserlian terms. As I translated the quotations from Husserl's works into English, I did consult the available translations and draw on them, but I endeavored to keep the technical vocabulary uniform - sometimes by fresh translations of the passages quoted and sometimes by slight alterations in the existing translations. I made these changes not so much out of any basic disagreement with other translators as out of a desire to keep the terminology uniform throughout the book. 1 For the

benefit of German and French readers not entirely at home with the English phenomenological vocabulary, I have included a small translation table in which my English equivalents for some central German terms are listed. Words with cognates or well-established phenomenological terms as their English equivalents have not been included. Finally, I should like to express my thanks to Prof.
