This volume makes a challenging critique of the idea of *Cosmopolis* - that is, the idea of world or 'global' government. In recent years this idea has been put forward as a way of averting the threat of war and international disorder, and as a way of avoiding the destruction of the planet. Proponents of this idea call for a radical reform of the United Nations which aims to legitimize this institution as an international police force and as a provider of global justice. Zolo criticizes this new cosmopolitan philosophy and rejects the idea of trying to eliminate international conflict through the use of centralized and

superior military force. He seeks instead to develop a conception of international relations which takes account of their pluralistic, dynamic and conflictual nature. This conception moves away from the logic of hierarchical centralization, which so dominates the UN Charter, and towards the logic of 'weak interventionism' and 'weak pacifism' which relies on self-organization, co-ordination and negotiation. Timely, provocative and iconoclastic, *Cosmopolis* is an important contribution to current debates in politics, international relations and social and political theory.

On Friday, August 13, 2010, just as St. Martin's Press was readying its initial shipment of this book, the Department of Defense contacted us to express its concern that our publication of *Operation Dark Heart* could cause damage to U.S. national security. After consulting with our author, we agreed to incorporate some of the government's changes into a revised edition of his book while redacting other text he was told was classified. The newly revised book keeps our national interests secure, but this highly qualified warrior's story is still intact. Shaffer's assessment of successes and failures in Afghanistan remains dramatic, shocking, and crucial reading for anyone concerned about the outcome of the war. "While I do not agree with the edits in many ways, the DoD redactions enhance the reader's understanding by drawing attention to the flawed results created by a disorganized and heavy handed military intelligence bureaucracy." —Lt. Shaffer Lieutenant Colonel Anthony Shaffer had run intelligence operations for years before he arrived in Afghanistan. He was part of the "dark side of the force"---the shadowy elements of the U.S. government that function outside the bounds of the normal system. His group called themselves the Jedi Knights and pledged to use the dark arts of espionage to protect the country from its enemies. Shaffer's mission to Afghanistan, however, was unlike any he had ever experienced before. There, he led a black-ops team on the forefront of the military efforts to block the Taliban's resurgence. They not only planned complex intelligence operations to beat back the insurgents, but also played a key role in executing those operations---outside the wire. They succeeded in striking at the core of the Taliban and their safe havens across the border in Pakistan. For a moment Shaffer saw us winning the war. Then the military brass got involved. The policies that top officials relied on were hopelessly flawed. Shaffer and his team

were forced to sit and watch as the insurgency grew---just across the border in Pakistan. This wasn't the first time he had seen bureaucracy stand in the way of national security. He had participated in Able Danger, the aborted intelligence operation that identified many of the future 9/11 terrorists but failed to pursue them. While the broader population is lulled into apathy—diverted to consumerism or hatred of the vulnerable—the corporations and the rich have increasingly been allowed to do as they please. Fierce, unsparing, and meticulously documented, *Who Rules the World?* delivers the indispensable understanding of the central conflicts and dangers of our time that we have come to expect from Chomsky.

C'è chi pensa che il Califfato sia alle porte e su Roma sventolerà la bandiera nera degli integralisti. Da anni la nostra paura e i nostri sensi di colpa trovano nell'Islam la loro causa prima. Al contrario, è semmai 'modernista' e 'occidentalista': il suo nucleo forte è costituito dalla volontà di appropriarsi degli elementi di potenza propri dell'Occidente conseguendoli però attraverso il linguaggio e i valori musulmani (non 'occidentalizzare/modernizzare l'Islam', bensì 'islamizzare l'Occidente/Modernità'). Esso non è affatto

neppure una forma di 'politicizzazione della religione'; al contrario, è semmai una forma di 'religionizzazione della politica'. I jihadisti nominano di continuo il Nome di Allah, ma pregano poco e trascurano allegramente le cinque preghiere canoniche quotidiane; difficile coglierli con la macchina fotografica o la telecamera mentre hanno in mano un Corano o una subha, mentre è consueto che armeggino con telefonini e computer. La loro ispirazione si presenta come arcaica, ma i loro atteggiamenti sono in realtà postmoderni. Non somigliano affatto agli ansar del Profeta, ma piuttosto ai guerrilleros del 'Che' Guevara o ai politiche Soldaten descritti da von Salomon e definiti da Carl Schmitt.»
